Liberty was a wonderful, life-loving person who is deeply missed and thought of fondly by all in our school community.




Big Bang Fair











**Year 8 Portraiture –

Gardening

This academic year has seen Woodrush flourish through a range of 'Green' initiatives. We have developed courses, resources and forces in our pursuit to expose our young people to the wide range of opportunities in the 'Green' sector. This year has witnessed our first cohort of learners successfully pass City and Guilds qualifications in both Horticulture and Sustainability and the Green Environment, very well done to you all!

We have also developed our Forest School provision by engaging more pupils than ever in this valuable support programme. Furthermore, we have also set up an extra curricular Gardening Club for KS3 pupils which is led by Sixth Form pupils.

Our programmes run in conjunction with the Tree Council and Network Rail who support us with volunteer planting days and resources to kickstart our major planting programmes. These include developing an apple orchard which allows our pupils to 'graft and grow' apple trees to distribute into the local community through our 'Tree Bank'. We are also growing a large stock of Willow trees to allow us to make 'woven willow' trees which the pupils can distribute to the local community through a self managed pupil enterprise scheme. Furthermore, we have now planted over 2500 trees and shrubs on site this year - well done to everyone who has taken part - this is over 300 pupils at last count!

Additionally, we are now up and running with our vegetable garden and new polytunnel which gives access for pupils to learn about planting, maintaining and harvesting their own produce which is reinvested into our own on site canteen and planting sites for flowers around the school grounds. In recognition of our achievements over the past twelve months, Lord Hendy, the CEO of Network Rail officially opened our community garden in the early Spring by planting a commemorative cherry tree on site. Many congratulations to him on his recent appointment to Minister of State at the Department for Transport.

Next academic year will see these projects grow literally in the amount of pupils involved and the produce created as Woodrush seeks to be an innovative thinker in the 'Community Curriculum' model.



This follows two years of collaboration between our school and local community volunteers and businesses who have supported us to become a flagship school for partnerships.

The presentation, attended by our Chair of Trustees, Professor Stuart Brand and Fraser Pithie, Trustees, was used as an opportunity for us to emphasize our ambitions to promote Woodrush as giving all stakeholders: 'A sense of Purpose, A sense of Pride, A sense of Place' .

Our collaborations with these organisations have enabled us to deliver the following experiences and opportunities to students:

Only school in the country who have adopted a train station Students have led the planning, planting and renovation of the station kiosk, displays and embankment.

We are the first UK provider of the Level 2 City and Guilds in Sustainability and the Green Environment which has meant 34 Year 10's have taken an early qualification. We are able to offer the Level 1 City and Guilds in Practical Horticultural Skills With the Tree Council, over the past month, we have planted 2000 trees

We have been able to invest in equipment to enhance our outdoors curriculum and to develop a Woodrush garden for growing vegetables and fruits.

The students involved in the day were outstanding ambassadors for Woodrush and they accompanied Lord Hendy and the delegation onto Wythall Transport Museum and then the opening of the new Henley-In-Arden train station along with Professor Brand, Mr Reece (our Community Curriculum Lead).

This event signals a strengthening of our collaboratives and outreach strategy and is indicative of the ongoing ambition of the school to promote opportunities for students, the school and the communities we serve.

This week the Year 10 Girls Rounders Team represented Woodrush at the Redditch District Rounders Competition.









Literacy Leaders



Book Club




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
